1. Welcome, introduction and apologies

2. Prevent Presentation

Paul Burke, Prevention Officer Cumbria Police, outlined the threats Cumbria faced from national and international terrorism. The key element was to stop people from becoming terrorists by prevention methods. Using the 4 Ps – pursue, prevent, protect and prepare the aim was to reduce threat, reduce vulnerability and so reduce risk. Statistics had shown that grooming methods included social media and online gaming. Channel was a multi-agency safeguarding programme to help identify and support people at risk of radicalisation. The Channel Panel in Cumbria was chaired by Jim Onions, CCC, with a single point of contact for each partner. Referrals to the panel were made via the Multi Agency Safeguarding Hub. The Prevent duty guidance applied to many CSP partners and was not a tick box exercise. Up to £10K was available to all district councils and a county wide approach through Safer Cumbria was anticipated, with one outcome the provision of training for all relevant targeted staff e.g. in schools and within councils.

3. Notes from the joint South Lakeland and Barrow CSPs meeting 30 July 2015

Agreed to be an accurate record. No outcome yet from the Kendal Court closure consultation.

4. Cumbria Constabulary update

Rob O'Connor reported on the crime statistics across South Cumbria April – Oct this year, compared to last year. ASB had reduced and violence with and without injury had increased,

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mainly due to changes in recording standards. All crime had reduced in the Barrow area and increased in the Kendal area, mainly violent crime, criminal damage and theft. In the last 12 months, Barrow averaged 60 crimes per 1,000 population and South Lakeland 36 crimes per 1,000 population. Overall, crime had increased across South Cumbria and this was a national trend. As part of a recent restructure, the area had split into 5 geographical areas of responsibility, with staff being deployed from 2 centres only, Barrow and Kendal.

Vulnerable Localities Index (VLI) – this was an analytical tool, which looked at a number of data sets to identify priority locations to work with partners and tackle crime. Cumbria Police had identified 2 pilot wards, based on VLI scores. A 12 month pilot with partners on Ormsgill ward in Barrow would commence in January aimed at reducing crime and disorder and demand for services. A full time PC and PCSO would be assigned to the project. Partners involved included the Well, BBC, Children's centres and schools.

The new police station in Barrow opened in October and performance did not suffer during the relocation. The police were facing more financial challenges due to changes in the funding formula as well as expected funding reduction due to the spending review. These reductions were expected to lead to more cuts in frontline staff. A consultation on proposed changes to the funding formula was currently underway and the outcome may have an impact on partnership work. (Post meeting note – the Government has announced that due to problems with the new funding formula calculations, the proposed changes had been postponed for 12 months)

5. South Lakeland and Barrow CSPs quarter 2 reports 2015/16

South Cumbria Alcohol Strategy Group and NPS (legal highs) update

- Mock trials were planned for Barrow working with NACRO
- Police and BBC were currently looking at developing a Cumulative Impact Policy (CIP) for identified parts of the town related to the night time economy
- Community Alcohol Partnership (CAP) – linking with the VLI project at Ormsgill, the group were exploring the possibility of a pilot CAP working with partners, alcohol retailers and community members
- Plans were under way to develop a campaign to target verbal, physical and racist abuse towards taxi drivers. Currently aiming to raise awareness through a number of methods e.g. media campaign, posters, car stickers, beer mats etc
- CSP agreed funding for The Well feasibility study which is currently underway
- NPS (Legal highs) training sessions have been held in north and west Cumbria, with positive feedback from the 4 sessions provided so far. Training would take place in Kendal and Barrow 7 & 8 Dec. There was a lot of interest from health professionals across the county and it was suggested that NPS training should be organised by the CCG / Cumbria Partnership Foundation Trust as part of continuing professional development for their staff.

South Cumbria Acquisitive Crime Group

- Focus remained on rural crime prevention. 2 events scheduled at Ulverston Auction mart and Jct 36 auction centre promoted crime prevention advice including Lock it or Lose it. Partners involved included police, Victim Support, Trading Standards, Age UK, Crimestoppers and Neighbourhood Watch
- Working with police on a combined crime prevention plan branded to Lock it or Lose it. Police campaign starting Dec and CSPs to contribute to this to broaden coverage in south. This included mirror radio ads on the Bay and Lakeland radio and on line ads with Westmorland Gazette. Number of radio slots and on line ads to be confirmed
- Campaign included 4 x purse bell events in Dec at Kendal, Windermere,

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Ulverston & Barrow targeting purse thefts and promotion of personal responsibility to property safe. Partners would include Police, Age UK, Victim Support and N Watch

- Potential campaign in new year to target cycle thefts. Meeting scheduled with Wheelbase to consider what the campaign could offer
- Lock it or Lose it materials distributed via Age UK in South Lakeland & Barrow. Approx 1500 business cards, 50 posters and 500 leaflets

Funding Allocations

A funding spreadsheet was circulated, listing all projects the Alcohol and Acquisitive Crime groups planned, with funding required. All items listed were agreed and some funding remained unallocated. Both task groups would consider further projects.

- Remaining ideas for funding allocations for 2015/ 2016 to be agreed by next meeting

6. CSP Strategic Assessment

The current strategic assessment summaries for South Lakeland and Barrow had been circulated. These were drafts and based on data, with no analysis or context included. Partners were requested to consider priorities for 2016/17, which could be the same as the current priorities. Any suggestion should be based on where CSP could add value, provide local focus and avoid any duplication. For example, there was an overlap with public health in relation to alcohol projects and links had already been made with the public health locality managers in Barrow and South Lakeland. A police strategic assessment was due, that would provide a business case for police priorities next year and may be useful to partners. Business crime had increased, and included crimes such as credit card fraud and cyber crime. Alcohol misuse remained the greatest issue and was linked to a rise in assaults with and without injury.

7. Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner (OPCC)

The PCC had now commissioned 4 elements of the Turning in the Spotlight project. They were:

1. Step Up programme for adolescents who were violent towards parents
2. DV in families and adolescent relationships
3. Perpetrator programmes across Cumbria
4. Hate crime programme delivered by AWAZ with CROPT

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South Lakeland & Barrow CSPs – Future working arrangements

Report

1. In October 2014, the individual South Lakeland and Barrow Community Safety Partnerships met as a joint group for the first time. At that meeting it was agreed to hold joint meetings with a joint chair and a shared CSP coordinator. It was further agreed that those arrangements would continue until March 2016, when the arrangement would be re-considered. At the time, a merger was not considered as an option.

2. As part of the arrangements, SLDC Councillor Graham Vincent was elected as joint chair and Jenny Draper has undertaken the role of shared coordinator 2 days per week. Funding of £7k per annum was provided by the Police and Crime Commissioner for Cumbria (PCC) to cover the cost of a minimum 1 day per week CSP co-ordination to be matched by CSP statutory partners. SLDC received this money, acted as the Accountable Body for CSP finances, with responsibility for processing all orders and invoices related to CSP projects and maintaining financial records. Admin support for CSP meetings, including venues and refreshments has been provided by SLDC, BBC and Cumbria Police. It is expected that the allocation for CSP coordinator support from the PCC will continue into 2016/17 as previously confirmed.

3. The chair and CSP coordinator attend bi monthly Safer Cumbria Chairs group meetings and bi annual Safer Cumbria Consultative Forums. The coordinator has attended quarterly Safer Cumbria Domestic Violence Operational group meetings and been involved in the refresh of the Safer Cumbria Domestic Homicide Review guidance. Travelling to meetings in Penrith effectively loses approx. 4 -5 working hours, so these are kept to a minimum.

4. Quarterly joint CSP meetings have been well attended, although not all statutory partners attend. Work has been undertaken to address this gap and will need to be monitored going forward. There have been quarterly task group meetings addressing the 2 priorities of alcohol related crime and acquisitive crime. Both

groups have completed projects in respective action plans, with updates reported to joint CSP meetings. In total, there have been 12 scheduled CSP meetings this year, with additional working group meetings to plan the NPS project (4 meetings), the taxi awareness campaign (2 meetings) and the acquisitive crime campaign (1 meeting)

5. Overall, the joint arrangement has worked well, but in some weeks, it is extremely difficult to complete all CSP work in 2 days. In addition, as we do not use a separate CSP email, emails are generally responded to across the working week, as necessary. It is estimated that CSP work averages at 2.5 days per week.

6. As the current arrangements only run until 31 March 2016, this presents an ideal opportunity to review them and potentially agree a longer term arrangement. Depending on what is agreed, this will potentially require a new terms of reference and a new Constitution.

7. There remains a statutory requirement for certain partners to be part of a group to identify and tackle crime in a specific location and in a 2 tier area, based on district boundaries.

8. Issues for consideration include:-

- How do partners feel the joint CSP is working? Does it deliver outcomes?
- Is there any desire to revert to 2 separate CSPs?
- As previously stated, an allocation of £7k from the Police and Crime Commissioner is expected in 2016/17 as well as an allocation of funding to CSPs for projects. SLDC is prepared to continue as accountable body and provide a shared coordinator, but another partner may also want to undertake this role
- It would be advisable to retain the existing chair until after the district council elections in May. This would mean electing a new chair in the first available meeting after May. The chair will be a statutory partner representative.

9. Statutory partners have considered the options and their recommendation is to continue the current arrangement to work together, with a shared Partnership Plan and shared priorities. They further recommend to hold 4 joint meetings, with a joint chair and shared coordinator and to formalise the arrangement with a revised terms of reference to reflect these joint working arrangements.

10. Members are asked to note the report, discuss options and are recommended to agree a future working arrangement, based on the current model.

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South Lakeland & Barrow CSPs – Priorities for 2016/17 and Partnership Plan

Report

1. The Community Safety Strategic Assessment 2015 summary documents for South Lakeland and Barrow were shared at the joint CSP meeting 29 October 2015. There was a general discussion, but no clear indication of what the 2016/17 priorities should be.

2. The current priorities for 2015/16 are alcohol related crime, including a focus on New Psychoactive Substances (NPS) also known as Legal Highs and acquisitive crime. These priorities were set in January 2015, using the data available in the Barrow and South Lakeland community safety strategic assessments for 2014 and taking account of the most recent police and partner data. Partners also considered existing work that was either underway or planned. They aimed to focus South Cumbria CSP work on where the partnership could add value, avoid duplication of existing or new projects and fully utilise local knowledge and experience. This would ensure that the activity undertaken would benefit South Lakeland & Barrow communities.

3. Currently operating at a county wide level are operational groups under Safer Cumbria for Domestic Violence, Sexual Violence, Offender Management, Hate Crime and Victim Services. There is also a Domestic Violence Champions Network operating at county level. The PCC has commissioned the Turning the Spotlight project that encompasses 4 separate programmes addressing domestic abuse and hate crime and the Bridgeway project for victims of sexual violence. There is a Cumbria Alcohol Group, but this group has not met for some months and is currently reviewing operating arrangements. There is no county wide group addressing acquisitive crime.

4. At local level, the South Cumbria Alcohol Strategy Group was initially set up in 2011 in response to a lack of strategy and direction at county level. The group had,

until this year, its own strategy. Currently the action plan is based on the 4 elements of the Cumbria Alcohol Strategy. These are to:-

- Reduce harms to health
- Reduce alcohol related crime/ASB improving community safety
- Protect young people from alcohol related harm and
- Reduce alcohol related social and economic harms

This is a very active group and has led on the county wide NPS training project and agreed at the last meeting to support the development of a Community Alcohol Partnership (CAP) in Barrow. Whilst this is not directly a CSP project, the CAP will build on the existing established partnership links within the group and use elements of the SCASG action plan. This would be the first CAP in Cumbria and has potential to work as a pilot, sharing learning with north and west CSPs.

5. Alcohol related crime overall in South Cumbria has decreased by 2% from April to Dec 2015 and although violence against the person with and without injury has increased, mainly due to changes in national crime recording standards, the number of crimes where alcohol is a factor have decreased. NPS continue to be a concern in South Cumbria and the Alcohol task group is keen that Alcohol and NPS remain a priority for 2016/17.

6. The Acquisitive Crime group was set up in 2014 in response to a rise in burglary and rural crime. The bulk of the work undertaken by this group has been around crime prevention, with awareness raising campaigns targeting agricultural crime, purse thefts, bike thefts, shoplifting and burglaries from insecure properties. The group has worked successfully on campaigns and partners involved include Cumbria Police, SLDC, BBC, Trading Standards, Victim Support, Crimestoppers, Junction 36 Auction Centre, Age UK, Neighbourhood Watch and Ulverston Auction Mart.

7. Based on what we know from the Strategic Assessment and latest crime data, there are no new emerging issues. Violent crime continues to be the largest volume crime and alcohol use / misuse remains an issue in communities. This is supported by the agreement to develop a Community Alcohol Partnership (CAP) in an identified area in Barrow.

8. The recommendation from the Alcohol task group is to continue this priority, including NPS, maintaining quarterly meetings. The view of the Acquisitive crime group is to meet twice a year, assessing current issues and planning events with partner involvement as required.

9. It is anticipated that there will be a significant increase in contractors moving into to Barrow during the next 12 months. It is further recommended to monitor emerging issues through the year and for the joint CSP to respond as required.

10. It is recommended that the Partnership Plan for 2016-17 remains a single sided document and if this is agreed, a draft version will be circulated to members for

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comment. The final version will be published by 1April, emailed to partners and formally approved at the next joint CSP meeting.

11. Members are asked to note the report, consider and agree the recommendations.

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CSP funding 2015 -16

Report

1. The amount of funding allocated by the Police and Crime Commissioner in 2015/16 to South Cumbria and the amount carried forward from 2014/15, has previously been reported to this meeting. The total amount available to the CSP in 2015/16 is £37,651.

2. Based on the allocation of funding to date, we have allocated almost £29,000 from the £37,651 available to the joint CSPs.(Appendix 1) There are some projects with funding allocated to them totaling £3,000 – the taxi awareness campaign and bike security campaign, that are still going ahead, but the final cost of these is not confirmed. We now know that there is insufficient partner capacity to develop the mock trial project which had £2,000 allocated to it. Based on what we know, there is a potential underspend of approximately £11,000.

3. The financial position was discussed with statutory partners, who are keen that the full allocation can be completed. In addition, the joint CSP Chair would not want to report any underspend to the Police and Crime Commissioner.

4. The South Cumbria Alcohol Strategy Group are aware that South Lakeland missed out on the NPS training funded by the PCC across Cumbria, with only 8 people managing to get to venue which followed the weekend of Storm Desmond. The cost of a one off training session for 25 people would be £975 + the hire of a venue and lunch - £350. This makes a total of £1,325. Other ideas are training sessions for taxi drivers to include raising awareness of the potential signs /indicators of Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE). Enquiries have also been made regarding the Junior Citizen Scheme in south Cumbria, something which both CSPs have supported. It is expected to run in June and there is potential to make a contribution to those costs. Indicative costs will be available at the meeting.

5. There is also an option to take suggestions from partners on condition that they are aligned to priorities, meet outcomes in the joint Partnership Plan and are agreed by this group.

6. Members are asked to consider the report, make comment and agree the process to allocate remaining funding.

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Domestic Homicide Reviews

Report

1. Members will be aware that South Lakeland CSP conducted the first Domestic Violence Homicide Review (DHR) in Cumbria in 2013. Since that review, 2 more have taken place, 1 each in west and north Cumbria. Resources to cover the cost of a chair for all 3 was provided from different sources and unsustainable.

2. The issue of how we provide chairs to conduct Domestic Homicide Reviews (DHRs) was escalated for discussion to the Safer Cumbria Delivery Board. For information, when the South Lakeland DHR was conducted there was funding via CCC from the Area Based Grant to cover the cost of an external chair. This funding is no longer available and for the most recent DHR in north Cumbria, the PCC provided funding. This was on the proviso that CSP Chairs considered alternative options for how chairs could be sourced and paid for in the future. This task fell to CSP chairs because the responsibility to conduct a DHR and provide a report to the Home Office lies with the local CSP.

3. As part of the South Lakeland DHR case study, we identified that covering the cost of a panel chair was an issue. We suggested that a bank of review chairs could be trained who could chair DHRs (and serious case reviews) across the county. These could be retired professionals who could undertake the role for the payment of expenses. This idea was expanded further to include a possible bank of chairs in neighbouring counties who could be called upon with a reciprocal arrangement. It was not thought realistic that the chair would only receive expenses as this is a critical role.

4. One of the suggestions tabled is for CSP statutory partners to each pay an agreed amount of money e.g. £750 per annum into a central pot. This money would be used to cover the costs of a DHR chair in any CSP area in the county. Having an accessible pot of funding would mean that if it was agreed to undertake a review, the respective CSP would be able to access funding for a chair.

5. The views of statutory partners in South Lakeland & Barrow CSPs was sought on whether or not they could support this approach in principle in order to report back to Safer Cumbria. It is not known if the statutory partners with a county wide remit, e.g. Cumbria Police, Cumbria County Council, Cumbria Clinical Commissioning Group and Cumbria & Lancashire Community Rehabilitation Company would be asked to contribute based on 3 CSP areas.

6. The South Lakeland & Barrow CSP statutory partners had an alternative view that in each CSP area a cost sharing arrangement between statutory partners could be agreed to cover the cost of a DHR in that area only.

6. Members are asked to note the report, consider the suggestions for funding future DHRs and agree an approach to report back to Safer Cumbria on behalf of the joint South Lakeland & Barrow CSP.
