Crime Statistics for 2016-2017

Cumbria has the second lowest number of recorded crimes in England and Wales for the 12 months to September 2016.

4,166 victims of anti social behaviour
2,332 victims reporting domestic violence in South Cumbria
1,683 victims of criminal damage
283 drug offences
2,446 victims of violent crimes
240 victims of house burglary
(1,367 of all South Cumbria recorded crimes (8,373) were related to alcohol, an increase of 6% compared to the previous year).

CSP Projects in 2016-17

Alcohol awareness for schools: The CSP commissioned a play 'One 2 Many' and a set of lesson plans for 13-14 year olds in nine schools in South Cumbria. These give young people an increased understanding of the risks and effects of alcohol on personal safety, decision making and future career choice.

Tackling rural crime: 2,000 "Avoiding Fraud" booklets and 1,500 handbooks for farms on fire safety, health and crime prevention have been distributed to homes and farms in South Cumbria, targeted especially at elderly or isolated residents.
